LOCATION AND CONNECTIONS

Leuven is easy to reach by car, bus and train.

By train Leuven is only 20 minutes from Brussels, 40 minutes from Antwerp, 50 minutes from Liège, 90 minutes from the Belgian coast and at 2 to 3 hours from cities like Düsseldorf, Paris, Amsterdam, Calais,... The university city is also only a 15 minute train ride away from Brussels International Airport.

As to car traffic, Leuven is at the junction of two major motorways: E40 and E314. In Leuven the buses of the public transport company De Lijn will swiftly take you anywhere in the city.

SURFACE AREA AND NUMBER OF INHABITANTS

The town of Leuven covers an area of 14,371 acres and consists of the boroughs Heverlee, Leuven and Wilsele and part of the former municipalities Wijgmaal, Korbeek-Lo and Haasrode (since 1 January 1977).

On the 1st of January 2007 Leuven had 91.933 inhabitants.

On 1 January 1995, Leuven became the capital of the province Flemish Brabant. The former province of Brabant was split into Flemish and Walloon Brabant and the metropolitan region of Brussels.

Leuven, a town proud of its past

Leuven is very proud of both its past and its heritage, and rightly so. There is so much to see and to do in and around Leuven that one visit is simply not enough.

Although the first references to the town can be traced back as far as the 9th century and in spite of its strategic location on the river Dyle, it was not until around the 11th-12th century that Leuven began to develop as an important trading centre within the Duchy of Brabant. It was at this time that its first town wall, churches, monasteries and abbeys were built.

The town's once flourishing cloth trade had fallen into decline by the 14th century, but a new golden age dawned with the 15th century. The university was founded (1425), various industrial concerns flourished and the main market square with its fine Gothic Town Hall was laid out.

The finely sculpted Town Hall and Saint Peter's church with its magnificent interior in which hangs the famous 'Last Supper' by

Dirk Bouts, are fine examples of flamboyant Gothic architecture at its best. Dating from the same period are the Cloth Hall, 't Sestich House and many churches, including St Gertrude's with its magnificent choir stalls.

Other architectural styles are not quite so well represented, but they can still be found. The Romaanse Poort (Romanesque Gate), Saint James's' church and the remains of the first town wall are still clearly in evidence.

The 13th century beguinage complex has cobbled streets and fascinating 17th century houses.

The baroque style abounds in Leuven, from Saint Michael's church and the interior of the John the Baptist's church to the unrivalled stucco of Park Abbey. Both Park Abbey and Arenberg Castle are exciting mixtures of architectural styles.

The town still owes much of its character to the numerous university college buildings dating from the 16th and 17th centuries, many of which were renovated in the 18th century. Van Dale College is pure Renaissance style and De Valk College, Pauscollege (Pope's College) and the Arras College are neo-classical style. Vlierbeek Abbey is a fine example of this trend.

The building of paved roads, the canal in the 18th century and the expansion of the breweries created a great impetus for trade and population growth.

Unfortunately, this prosperity came to a sudden end under the reign of Joseph II and the French occupation.

The most significant development for Leuven in the 19th century was the building of the railway station and the construction of Bondgenotenlaan leading to it.

The two World Wars in the 20th century destroyed much of Leuven and a great deal of the reconstruction work lasted well into the nineteen-sixties.

Leuven has developed into a well-equipped, modern town with a thriving service industry economy and with a good balance of old and new buildings combining to offer a well-designed infrastructure to suit the demands of today's modern city with a rich tradition.







The 'Grote Markt' (Great Market Square) of Leuven

Stadhuis (Town Hall)

Tradition has it that the first Town Hall of Leuven was situated at the 'Oude Markt' or Old Market Square. The second was located on Great Market Square of Leuven. It had its place in a row of houses in front of Saint Peter's Church, but outside the present building line. The construction of the present Town Hall started in 1439.

The spacious cellars of the houses were retained when the building of the façade began. These cellars have been restored and can now be reached through a small door, at the bottom left part of the building.

Sulpicius van Vorst, under whose management the works had begun, died. Jan Keldermans II undertook the task and in 1448 Matthew de Layens was in charge. He altered some details of the plans. The belfry-tower that had to be built at the corner of Naamsestraat was left out so that the building got its Flamboyant Gothic character with four corner turrets, two ridge turrets and a balustrade all around the building.

There are three floors. Between the windows there are oriels.

each with two niches; three corner-turrets also have niches. The carved bases of these niches represent biblical subjects. The motif of sin and punishment is often repeated. These scenes had a didactic and admonishing function, not only for the common people but also for the judges who resided in the building.

The 236 statues in the niches were only placed after 1850. The whole set has become the Leuven pantheon! Unlike the figures in the bases who wear Burgundian clothes, the persons in the niches wear the clothes of the period in which they lived. The two rows on the ground floor represent artists, scholars and eminent citizens of the Leuven past. The first floor displays figures who symbolise the municipal privileges and the patron saints of the parishes. On the second floor the Counts of Leuven and the Dukes of Brabant can be noticed; the turrets represent biblical figures.

Since the nineteenth century three restorations have taken place. The latest finished in 1983 and repaired the war damage, suffered when a bomb scraped the façade and did not explode...

WANDELZAAL (HALL)

The waiting hall on the ground floor is in fact the covered extension of the Great Market Square; this is also what it was used for in the Middle Ages. From there it was possible to reach all the municipal services and via the towers you could gain access to the rooms on the upper floors and to the attics.

The beam blocks at the extremities of the seven oak girders were carved in 1448-1449 by Willem Ards, a Brussels woodcarver. He mainly sculpted scenes from the Old Testament. They were intended to inspire the town councillors to adopt a good and cautious policy and a righteous judgment.

At the beginning of the 20th century a number of monumental studio plasters of the famous artist Constantin Meunier were discovered. He resided in Leuven from 1887 through 1894 and he taught at the academy.

GOTHIC HALL

The carving of the beam blocks in the Gothic hall and the consoles on the side of the Great Market Square were also entrusted to Willem Ards. Here the New Testament was the source of inspiration, more specifically the life of Mary and Jesus. Obviously, this was not a coincidence. The New Covenant was indeed (in this instance literally) built on the Old one. Christ is also an example of righteousness – an example which is in the right place in this important location of the town hall.

During the last decades of the 19th century the Gothic hall was thoroughly restored. The floors and ceilings were repaired and the walls were covered. An impressive chimney was built on one of the short sides of the hall. For the walls the city



council commissioned eleven paintings from the Tournai artist André Hennebicq. He painted four monumental canvasses with important events from the history of Leuven and seven full length portraits of Leuven artists and scholars. This series is displayed between the windows on the side of the Great Market Square.

SALONS

The salons are located in the oldest section of the town hall. The walls of the first salon are decorated with the portraits of the Leuven burgomasters since the French period. In the 19th century this room was used as a council chamber. On the occasion of the visit of Leopold I to Leuven in 1852 the second and third salons were thoroughly refurbished. The paintings worked into the panelling date back to before the 19th century and belong to the municipal art collection. The eye-catcher in the second salon is the masterwork of Pieter-Jozef Verhaghen, Moses being introduced to the daughter of the pharaoh.

Sint-Pieterskerk (Saint Peter's Church)

Saint Peter's Church is the oldest church in Leuven. It was presumably founded in 986. The first church burnt down in 1176. A new Romanesque church was built with a crypt, an extension, at the back of the choir. The Westwork was flanked by two towers as can be seen in the old town seal.

The construction of the present Gothic building, much larger than the Romanesque church, started in 1425. Work began at the choir, under the supervision of architect Sulpicius van Vorst. Several architects succeeded him. Jan Keldermans II and Matthew de Layens played an important part in this respect. The church was practically completed in 1497. Of the three towers that were planned, one of which was to have reached a height of 170 meters, only the bases remain. In 1541 when the height of 50 meters was reached, work was stopped. The subsoil was not stable enough to support a higher tower. After some collapses, the tower was lowered to its present level. The successive architects did not change the original plans and this brought about a fine example of pure Brabantine Late Gothic Style.

The outside of the church, our attention is fixed on the choir with seven radiating chapels. Between two of these chapels the chapel of 'Fiere Margriet' (Proud Margaret), a local popular saint, was built in 1546.

The church was severely damaged in both World Wars. In 1914 the roof and nave burnt down and in 1944 the north aisle suffered bomb damage.

The Treasury of Saint Peter is housed in the church. Two masterpieces (15 C.) of the Flemish Primitive Dirk Bouts, i.e. The Last Supper and The Martyrdom of Saint Erasmus are on display.

The chancel and presbytery of the Saint Peter's Church house the treasury. Here you will not only find a number of rare religious objects in precious metals. In the radiating chapels there are also many paintings and sculptures, like the less well known masterpieces of Jodocus van der

Baren, Jan van Rillaer and Pieter-Jozef Verhaghen. They had been ordered by the guilds and fraternities between the 15th and the 18th century when they took over the care of the chapels. Three works of the so-called Flemish primitives are the real pearls of the crown. The Nobleman triptych is the most contemporary and hence the oldest copy of the Descent from the Cross which Rogier van der Weyden made for a Leuven chapel. The most famous panel is undoubtedly The Last Supper by Dirk Bouts. In 1464 this Leuven town painter was commissioned by the Brotherhood of the Holy Sacrament to paint a triptych for their chapel in the Saint Peter's Church representing the ordinance of the Eucharist. Bouts made this his absolute masterwork. The Martyrdom of Saint Erasmus located in the adjoining chapel was also made by Dirk Bouts at the request of the Brotherhood.

The sacrament tower opposite the chapel with *The Last Supper* constitutes a unit with the storage space for the hosts.

Finally, there are two striking tombs: the tomb of Henry I of Brabant in the presbytery and the double tomb of Matilda of Flanders, his wife, and Maria of Brabant, their daughter.

Tafelrond (Round Table)

The third most important building on the Great Market Square may well be of late mediaeval, Gothic origin; as it stands today it is a product of the reconstruction plans developed after the destruction of the city centre in 1914. During this fire the neoclassical Round Table was destroyed. This building was erected in 1817 to replace the original Round Table of 1480-1488 that formed an architectonic unit although it did comprise three separate houses. The architect was Mathieu de Layens. The reconstruction after the First World War was used to bring the old Round Table back to life. This finally occurred - as head office of the National Bank- according to the design of the Brussels architect Max Winders.







Beguinages

Groot Begijnhof (Great Beguinage)

Schapenstraat, 3000 Leuven

The origin of the name 'begijn' is unclear. These women only took temporary vows of chastity and obedience to the "mistresses" of their choice. As opposed to the conventuals they did not have to observe the rule of poverty and were therefore able to have private property and an income. For the remainder they provided for themselves via donations made to the 'begijnhof'. They also generated income from teaching, health care, manual labour like embroidery, sewing, washing, spinning...

When the 'begijnhof' was abolished in 1795 some 198 'begijnen' lived there. The more prosperous 'begijnen' had a private residence. The poorer 'begijnen' lived together in "convents", community houses. An infirmary was available for the sick and poor old 'begijnen'.

The Groot Begijnhof has the appearance of a small town in the city. It is a succession of streets, squares, gardens and parks, with tens of houses and convents in traditional brick and sand-stone style. This small town was restored between 1964 and 1989 by the Catholic University of Leuven, who had purchased the site in 1962 from the Social Welfare Commission. Today it houses students and university staff.

The old infirmary and the Chièvres Convent house the Faculty Club, the meeting place for science, culture and enterprise.

On 31 March 2000, it was officially recognised by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site.

The 'Groot Begijnhof' is open to the public free of charge.

Klein Begijnhof (Small Beguinage)

Halfmaartstraat, 3000 Leuven

A community of 'begijnen' also originated close to the Saint Gertrude's Abbey. This Klein Begijnhof was first mentioned in 1275. It was under the spiritual authority of the Abbot of Saint Gertrude.

Sint-Jan-de-Doperkerk van het Groot Begijnhof (Saint John the Baptist's Church in the **Great Beguinage)**

Groot Begijnhof, 3000 Leuven

This protected early-Gothic church dates back to the 14th century. During recent restoration works many frescos of the 14th, 15th and 17th century were exposed.

Sint-Michielskerk (Saint Michael's Church)

Naamsestraat, 3000 Leuven

Saint Michael's Church is considered to be the main Jesuit church in Belgium. The impressive façade in pure baroque style is characterized as "the altar outside the church" and is as such one of the seven wonders of Leuven.

The following churches are open to individual visitors from 1 April through 30 September on Saturday and Sunday between 1.30 p.m. and 4.30 p.m.

Sint-Kwintenskerk (Saint Quentin's Church)


Naamsestraat, 3000 Leuven

Although the construction and history of Saint Quentin's Church have a Romanesque base, in its present appearance this building bears a close resemblance to the Brabant high-Gothic style.

Sint-Geertruikerk (Saint Gertrude's Church)

Halfmaartstraat, 3000 Leuven

The church was constructed between the 13th and 15th century. The late Gothic tower, said to be one of the seven wonders of Leuven because its tower was built without securring pins, dates from 1454 and was constructed by the master builder of the Brussels' town hall, Jan van Ruysbroeck. In the church, noteworthy Late Gothic choir stalls can be admired. The abbey belonged to the Augustinian Order. (see page 28)









Sint-Antoniuskapel (Saint Anthony's Chapel)

Pater Damiaanplein, 3000 Leuven

Saint Anthony's Chapel is one of the many chapels built over the centuries near the five major parishes of Leuven (already mentioned in 1329). It was bought in 1860 by the superior of the Fathers of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary who promised to turn it into a shrine to Saint Joseph. The first pilgrimage took place in 1899. Many pilgrims from over the whole country still come mainly during the month of March. The church is open daily from 9 am to 6 pm.

Father Damian is buried in the crypt under the chapel. He was beatified in 1995 and in December 2005 he was elected 'Greatest Belgian'. Visitors from all over the world come to honour his memory. In the Damian centre (Sint-Antoniusberg 5) there is a documentation and information centre on Father Damian.

Sint-Jacobskerk (Saint James's Church)

Sint-Jacobsplein, 3000 Leuven

Of the original Romanesque church which dates from the beginning of the 13th century, only the tower remains. This tower is also one of the seven wonders of Leuven: a bell can be seen, hanging outside the tower! It must also be mentioned that the transept was constructed between 1457 and 1488 by the master builder of the Leuven town hall, Matheus de Layens.

Abbeys

Abdij van Park (The Norbertine Park Abbey -Premonstratans)

Abdij van Park 7, 3001 Leuven

Culture and nature in the heart of the old Brabant

Around 1100 the south-eastern border of Leuven was mainly woodland. This is where the Duke of Brabant, who had chosen Leuven as his residence, had his hunting ground. In 1129 Duke Geoffrey the Bearded bestowed this hunting ground onto the Premonstratiensens of Laon, in the North of France. This new institution rapidly became successful and in the Middle Ages became an important spiritual centre. One year later it detached itself from the mother abbey in France. Simon of Saint-Maurice (+ 1142) was the first abbot of the conventus Sanctae Mariae de Parco, a clear reference to the original hunting ground.

Following the tides and seasons Park Abbey developed into a successful religious house that would survive the perils of the following nine hundred years including the religious wars, the French Revolution and two world wars.

Today Park Abbey is a unique patrimonial estate with a green domain of 42 ha. It is an exceptional historic residual area on the Leuven border. The term "residual area" is appropriate as under the Ancien Régime the abbey property extended over 3,500 ha. The area was the life line of the Premonstratensians of Park-Heverlee. With the income they financed the construction and maintenance of the monastery buildings, acted as Maecenas and more importantly helped the poor. The tithes allowed them to build churches and rectories, the basis of one of the main Norbertine tasks: pastoral and parish care. In the 19th and 20th century missionary work in Latin America was included in these tasks.

Towards the middle of the 17th century the abbey achieved both economic and spiritual success. Its landownership extended over 130 villages in Brabant and beyond. The abbot of Park appointed one of his canons as parish priest in 15 parishes, mainly in the Hageland, the region between Leuven and Aarschot.

The present appearance of the abbey mainly dates back to the 17th and 18th century, but the ground plan of the site with the buildings patterns and the man-made landscape with the ponds are mediaeval. The tithe barn and carriage house were built in 1663 – 1664, under the authority of Abbot Libert de Pape. The last important construction campaign occurred under Abbot Hieronymus de Waerseggere (1719 – 1730). He gave the abbot's quarters its present appearance, altered most gates and the church and raised the church tower (1730). After this the construction activities came to a final standstill.

The soundness of the construction makes Park Abbey one of the best preserved abbey sites in Belgium and The Netherlands. The typical parts of the Ancien Régime ab-







bey have been extraordinarily well preserved: the monastery building and church built on an elevation, the separate provisor's (administrator's) office, the economic section of the farm, the water mill and the gardens at the foot of the slope and finally a belt of gates and walls as an enclosure.

Today a small number of Premonstratiensens carry on the tradition of community life and pastoral work. The splendid abbey with its oasis of ponds, meadows, alleys, orchards, gardens and woodland, the undamaged monastery interior, the monastery library that was extensively rebuilt after 1836 (over 6,000 old prints), the well-maintained old archives (1129 - 2005), the extraordinary art collection, the beautiful stucco ceilings ... all of these represent a particularly valuable cultural heritage.

Preserving this patrimony is a colossal task that the Premonstratiensens are unable to assume on their own. This is why the Park Abbey non-profit association gave large sections of the domain to the city of Leuven in leasehold: the fowl yard, the gates, the water mill, the grounds and four ponds. The church and the monastery continue to be managed by the Premonstratiensens. In the long term the Museum for Religious Art and Culture -Flanders Park Abbey Museum will be housed in large sections of the monastery building. The carriage house has been given in leasehold to the relief organisation Church in Need / East priest aid that is affiliated to the Premonstrationsens.

The survival of the unique Park Abbey group of buildings requires time, consultation and funds. Safeguarding, restoration and revaluation are the main concepts behind this ambitious project. The support for this is generated by the various partners: the Premonstratiensens, the city of Leuven, the Centre for Religious Art and Culture non-profit association, the Friends of Park Abbey non-profit association, the province Flemish-Brabant, the Catholic University of Leuven, the Flemish Community ... According to a cautious prognosis around 2012 the abbey and its domain will regain its radiant 17th century appearance adapted to the needs of the 21st century.

The opening up of the domain and the utilities will be adapted and the buildings will be restored. Most of the historic buildings will be given a suitable new purpose: as museum, reception point, exhibition area, catering facility customised to the site.

The city of Leuven will include the scenic and ecologically valuable surroundings of the abbey buildings in the restoration of the domain. The starting point for this is the realisation of a 'green lung' and an area for gentle recreation that respect the natural and environmental values. The ponds will be managed as a wildlife area. To the north of the abbey, in the triangular zone between the railways, a wide green buffer will be provided with a park wood, meadows and playing fields. Additional footpaths will guarantee optimal accessibility.

Sint-Geertruiabdij (Saint Gertrude's Abbey)

Halfmaartstraat, 3000 Leuven

This abbey is located at the heart of the Klein Begijnhof (see page 19). The buildings, built between the 14th and 17th centuries, have been recently restored and found a new purpose as a housing complex. The Thierry wing was built after the First World War using bombed façades from the city.

Abdij Keizersberg (Keizersberg Abbey)

This abbey of the Benedictine Order dates from the 19th century and was set up as a study house for the monks of the Maredsous Abbey on the Keizersberg. The abbey and the surrounding land is enclosed by a long wall. It gives the appearence of an old fortified castle, lying as it does on the site of the old ducal stronghold.


Abdij van Vlierbeek (Vlierbeek Abbey)

This abbey was founded by the Benedictine monks of Affligem in 1127. During the French period the monastery was abolished. Apart from the abbey's farm, the church and the abbot's residence are still standing, both built in the Classical style. In the cemetery, you see several tombstones of famous people.

Open on Sundays from 9 a.m. till 6 p.m.









Castles

Arenbergkasteel (Arenberg Castle)

The first castle on this site was erected in the 14th century. The de Croy family took over the property in 1446. The present castle was built over the following centuries in traditional style with late Gothic and Renaissance features. It was completely restored in the 19th century.

The Duke of Arenberg presented it to the University in 1916, and it is now being used by the K.U.Leuven Faculty of Applied Sciences.

Brits militair kerkhof 'De Jacht' '40-'45 (British Military Cemetery 'De Jacht' '40-'45)

Bierbeekpleindreef, 3001 Leuven

To be reached via Hertogstraat, on the corner of Bierbeekpleindreef and Kerspelstraat in Heverlee (Leuven).

Open: almost always, with visitors' register.

Stadskerkhof (Municipal Cemetery)

Kerkhofdreef 7, 3001 Leuven Several tombs of mayors of Leuven.

Open: every weekday from 8 a.m. to 3.45 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Miscellanea

Anatomisch Amfitheater van Rega (Rega's Anatomical Amphitheatre)

Minderbroedersstraat 50, 3000 Leuven

The anatomical theatre was built in 1744 by rector Rega as an auditorium for lessons in anatomy. The octagonal structure with large windows ensures light incidence from all sides and allows the students to follow cadaver dissections under good conditions. This light incidence made the building particularly suitable as a studio also. In 1887 the city of Leuven offered the theatre to Constantin Meunier to be used as a studio.

Collegium Trilingue (Trilingue College)

Busleidengang (Vismarkt), 3000 Leuven

In September 1518 the Trilingue College opened in Leuven, a foundation the theme of which was humanism.

This objective was achieved by the foundation by canon Jerome van Busleiden, envoy of Duke Charles. Busleiden was a friend of Erasmus. Through his contribution the college enjoyed great, even international fame. Hebrew, Greek and Latin were taught in the College and that is why it was called 'Trilingue', i.e. 'Three Languages'. After years of decay and lack of occupancy, the College was restored. After all, the 'Collegium Trilingue' is one of the few Renaissance buildings in Leuven that are left. The restored college halls, are available for seminars, exhibitions, conferences, meetings; to put it briefly: for all kinds of occasions! The splendid entrance hall and its 16th century stone winding staircase can still be admired.

LEUVEN-LA-NEUVE

Leuven is a city in full metamorphosis. Streets, squares, buildings as well as many town quarters are evolving in tune with our rapidly evolving society. This modernisation has been seized in Leuven to integrate quality contemporary architecture along with our century old set values. This quality is not only present in striking buildings but also in the pleasant squares, eye-catching car parks, lively stations and other infrastructures we use daily.

Old and new enhance one another and together create the municipal decor.

A taste of some interesting locations where the contemporary city manifests itself.

Railway Station (and surroundings)

For many visitors the station is the entrance hall to the city. In the coming years this contact point with the outside world will be shrouded by four waves of metal and glass according to the design of architect Samyn (Brussels).

Underground and under the roof two wide connections link the borough of Kessel-lo (youth hostel) with Leuven and provide ac-

cess to the many hundreds of trains that link Leuven within the hour with its numerous neighbouring cities (Brussel, Antwerpen, Gent, Liège...).

On the Leuven side of the station there is a very spacious station square and the striking red building of the bus company. Under all this you will find the most beautiful and pleasant underground car park in the country: both the driver leaving his car and the occasional passer-by can enjoy the sights in the underground car tunnel, the unexpected sights of the station and the city as well as at times the enormous spaces and warm lighting. The car park, the square and the bus station (designed by Manuel de Solà-Morales Rubio, Barcelona) harmonize smoothly with one another and with the station.

The strikingly modernistic provincial government building (architect Gonçalo Byrne, Lissabon), the head office of the brewery giant Inbev (architect Poponcini & Lootens, Antwerp) and various other (future) office buildings in the neighbourhood are a show card of contemporary architecture.

Penitentienenstraat and surroundings

The northern section of the inner city close to the Penitentienenstraat is a typical West-European city quarter. During the 19th and 20th century it flourished thanks to multiple industrial activities but towards the end of the last century it was engulfed in a downward spiral together with the industry.

By the year 2004 the sad industrial decline had already been extensively replaced with all kinds of dwelling places. The latter offer all income categories the opportunity of living in this outstanding location (peaceful, at walking distance from the city centre and station and a five minute drive from the motorway).

The revaluation operation was launched in 1997. The La Vignette project, offering 22 social owner-occupied properties, was built on previously undeveloped ground. The architects (architectural firm WIT, Outgaerden) opted for a modern and contemporary style: austere volumes, dark stone, wooden façade elements and properly dimensioned window arrangements. They drew a new street right between the Penitentienenstraat and the Fonteinstraat.

Behind La Vignette there is a local park skirted by newly built private terraced houses along the Penitentienenstraat.

A little further stands the red housing project "De Leerlooierij" (WVA, Leuven) where a factory building used to stand. Along the pedestrian inner city there are 32 modern owner-occupied houses.

The area between the Fonteinstraat and the Penitentienenstraat used to be a storage place for empty beer crates. Today it is a local park that provides a green breathing space for the neighbourhood. Footpaths and cycle paths along the Dijle connect the various green zones in the surroundings.





The neighbourhood is characterised by the renovated Silo tower (an old grain milling house) where in addition to a catering establishment various companies have their offices.

Tweebronnen

Rijschoolstraat 4, 3000 Leuven

The building of the municipal library was originally designed by the famous Belgian architect Henry van de Velde. It was built between 1936 and 1942.

In 1990 this former Technical School was protected as a culturally and historically valuable building. Between 1994 and 2000 the building was converted into a public library and municipal archive office by amongst others Georges Baines (Antwerp). Other functions were added to make this complex more relevant to the city: exhibition spaces, a café, a square, an auditorium and offices for various functions ...

The structure of the building has changed in line with the new requirements but the style of Henry van de Velde's building was maintained.

The architects took advantage of the functional change to highlight the municipal quality of the building. The former

playground of the school is now a municipal meeting place. Moreover, the building also has a transit function: there is an entrance in the Diestsestraat as well as in the Riischoolstraat.

Philipssite

Philipssite 4, 3001 Leuven

In 1995 the city of Leuven purchased the grounds of the former Philips factory to give it a new purpose. The successors of the Italian architect Aldo Rossi (Milan) together with architect De Gregorio (Hasselt) designed all the new buildings in addition to the layout plan for this site. Two main axes organise the whole. Along the first axis, which also provides access to the underground car park, there is the new police building, the new mail sorting centre for De Post and the new sports complex, an impressive oval arena. The former head office of the Philips factory, the only building on the site that remained standing, and a new office building are positioned along the second axis. The rest of the surface area is one extensive green zone.

STUK

Naamsestraat 96, 3000 Leuven

The STUK arts centre is clearly advertised by means of large metal letters along the Naamsestraat. As a former university hall it is located in the midst of various university buildings. The building (architects Neutelings Riedijk, Antwerp-Rotterdam) is erected around a public patio onto which various "rooms" give out: a cinema, a grand café, an auditorium, rooms, offices, an art factory etc. On the patio artists, visitors and passers-by meet and a different universe can be found behind each door. Many older parts of the former building have been renovated, whereas the new sections stand assertively shrouded in red bricks. A striking silver shed roof overhangs the complex thus enhancing the skyline of Leuven. Just as for the actual city an intriguing accumulation of various universes is obtained.

This building is the pinnacle of the urban planning vision adopted by both the city and university for the inner city. Tens of passageways offer walkers unexpected views and along the centuries old and contemporary buildings they discover new parts of this city that is literally intertwined with the university.

SIX CENTURIES OF HISTORY

The university of Leuven was founded almost six hundred years ago. Throughout the centuries people have always occupied centre stage at the University of Leuven. The University's academic fame has attracted scholars and scientists such as Justus Lipsius, Gerard Mercator and Andreas Vesalius who have all made valuable contributions to European intellectual life. Since the foundation of the university in 1425 Leuven has been both a city and a university. From the very beginning the two were interlinked and hence share a particularly rich past. Yet Leuven does not rest on its laurels. City and university use the most modern resources to further develop and to present themselves as the cradle of new ideas. The many historic and university buildings forming a heterogeneous but organic whole clearly indicates how Leuven city and university have merged.

The University of Leuven is almost six centuries old. At the beginning of the 15th century Leuven was looking for new growth opportunities. At the request of the city and with the support of Duke John IV of Brabant, Pope Martin V authorised the creation of a university on 9 December 1425. This makes the K.U.Leuven the oldest catholic university still in existence. Obviously, it is also the oldest university of the Low Countries.

After the model of Cologne, Paris and Vienna the university of Leuven originally had four faculties: Artes, Canon and Civil Law and Medicine and after 1432 also Theology. The city allowed the university to use the Cloth Hall. This building of 1317 had been used for over a century as a sales outlet for clothmakers. It soon became too small for lectures. Today the building is the management centre of the university.

The University of Leuven witnessed its first flourishing period in the 16th century. It acquired international fame thanks to the presence of renowned scholars and professors like Adriaan van Utrecht (Pope Adrian VI, the last non-Italian pope before John-Paul II), Erasmus, Vives, Vesalius and Mercator.

Six centuries of history not only bring prosperity but also adversity. In the 18th century the university came under heavy pressure from the government and in 1797 the French Republic even abolished the university. However, breeding will out. In 1816 the University of Leuven opened its doors again as a State University set up by King William I of the United Kingdom of the Netherlands. In 1834 the Belgian bishops founded a Catholic University in Mechelen. However, in 1835 the university returned to its familiar Leuven where the State University had already been abolished.

The reality of the Belgian language problem, i.e. the occasionally difficult cohabitation of the Flemings and Walloons, is reflected in the subsequent history of the Leuven Alma Mater. 1911 saw the start of the slow Dutchification of university education at the University of Leuven. This gradually resulted in the doubling of the lectures that were usually given in parallel in Dutch and in French.

A great deal of activity also occurred outside Leuven. In 1954 the university founded the 'Universiteit Lovanium' in the former Belgian Congo. And more recently a university campus was set up in Kortrijk in 1965, where students can obtain a Bachelor's degree in four faculties: first the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Law, then in 1971 also the Faculty of Medicine and the Faculty of Science. Since 1991 it is also possible to obtain a Bachelor's degree in Applied Economic Sciences, these courses are organised in cooperation with the Ufsia in Antwerp.

As the tension between the language groups increased in 1968 this led to the creation of two autonomous universities. They became autonomous by law in 1970: the Dutchspeaking Catholic University of Leuven (K.U.Leuven), remained in Leuven whereas the French-speaking Université Catholique de Louvain (UCL), moved to Louvain-la-Neuve in Ottignies (in Wallonia). Notwithstanding these events the K.U.Leuven became the most important university in the country. Dutch is the official language of the K.U.Leuven.







Facts and figures

Students

During the academic year of 2005-2006 some 31,470 students attended the K.U. Leuven including 3,887 foreign students.

Universiteitshal (University Hall)

Naamsestraat 22, 3000 Leuven

This prestigious building of 1317 was originally the municipal Cloth Hall and only comprised a ground floor in Gothic style. In 1432 the newly founded university was housed in the wing on the Krakenstraat. The hall was used as a lecture hall until the First World War. In 1679 the city sold the entire building to the University that immediately built the baroque first floor. In 1723 the Rega wing was added (classical sandstone façade overlooking Oude Markt). Today the Registrar's Office is housed here.

Heiliggeestcollege (College of the Holy Spirit)

Naamsestraat 40, 3000 Leuven

In 1942 the aristocrat Lodewijk de Rycke gave the University a house for students of the Faculty of Theology, the oldest college institution of the university. The college was completely renovated in the 18th century. It is still being used as a student residence

The Heiliggeestcollege also houses the Spoelberchmuseum. This permanent exhibition displays a selection from the art collection bequeathed to the university by Viscount Charles-Victor de Spoelberch (1836-1907) at the beginning of the past century. An ancestral portrait gallery, collector's furniture, family silver and a collection of European and Oriental porcelain are the highlights of this collection (16th-19th century).

The museum is open to individual visitors every second Saturday of the month between 2 p.m. and 5 p.m., except on public holidays. Groups must first make an appointment with a guide of the K.U. Leuven, tel. +32 (0)16 32 40 07.

Atrechtcollege (Arras College)

Naamsestraat 63, 3000 Leuven

This college was founded in 1508 by Nicolaus Ruterius, provost of Saint Peter's Chapter and later bishop of Atrecht, who housed this college for poor scholars in his own home which he had adapted for the purpose. From 1921 to 1977 the building housed a college for the first generation of female students. The courtyard boasts a beautiful Sophora Japonica planted in the 18th century, also known as "the tree of sorrow": because in those days the girls had to be in their room by 7 p.m. and this led to heartrending parting scenes by the tree! Today the house is shared by the Study Advisory Centre and

the Verbieststichting (Verbiest Foundation), which specialises in relations with China.

Van Dalecollege (Van Dale College)

Naamsestraat 80, 3000 Leuven

In 1569 Canon Pieter van Dale of Antwerp, a former student of the University, founded this college for poor students from Antwerp and Aalst who wanted to study theology, philosophy or canon law. This college is the only college to have been preserved in its original state and is also the oldest authentic Renaissance building in the city. Since 1986 it again provides accommodation for students and currently houses the Student Facilities Department.

Hogenheuvelcollege (High Hill College)

Naamsestraat 75, 3000 Leuven

The house was built in the 15th century by Golin van 't Sestich, husband of Katharina van Vlaenderen (Catherine of Flanders). The Roman numerals LX, high in the splendid Gothic brick façade, clearly refers to the family name. The Star of David in the gable and a Hebrew inscription on another façade lead us to assume that the inhabitants who had emigrated from Germany were of Jewish origin. The college was founded in 1683 when the Utrecht student priests of the Hogenheuvelcollege in Cologne were transferred to this house in Leuven. The new college, which was fortuitously located in the highest point of the city, quite appropriately kept its old name. Today it houses the Faculty of Economics and Applied Economic Sciences.

Aula Pieter De Somer (Pieter De Somer Auditorium)

Debériotstraat 24, 3000 Leuven

This auditorium, designed by architect Paul van Aerschot, was opened in 1989 and is the largest auditorium of the university. The statue of Pieter De Somer, who became the first rector of the autonomous Dutch-speaking University of Leuven in 1968, and which stands in front of the building was created by Vic Gentils.









Pauscollege (Pope's College)

Hogeschoolplein 3, 3000 Leuven

This college for theology students was founded in 1523 by Pope Adrian VI, a former professor of the university. In 1776 the college was rebuilt in classical style. Ten years later Joseph II moved the Seminary General to this college and from 1825 to 1830 it was used as the Philosophy College of William I. Today it still houses students.

Maria-Theresia College and Grote Aula (Maria-Theresa College and Great Auditorium)

Sint-Michielsstraat 2, 3000 Leuven

In 1778 Maria Theresa housed the theology seminary in this former Jesuit College. The wing on the right was added for the Seminary-General of Joseph II in 1786-89. The Faculty of Theology is still based here. In 1826-27 King William I had the Great and Small Auditoriums built in the inner courtyard. They now serve as auditoriums and halls for congresses, colleges and concerts.

College De Valk (De Valk College)

Tiensestraat 41, 3000 Leuven

This is the former college of the Artes Faculty, which was founded around 1434 and moved to this site in 1543. The neoclassical buildings date from the late 18th century. The Faculty of Law is based here. In 1966 a new complex was added next to the old college.

Hoger Instituut voor Wijsbegeerte (Higher Institute of Philosophy)

Kardinaal Mercierplein 2, 3000 Leuven

This building of 1893 houses the Faculty of Philosophy and the famous Husserl Archive.

Universiteitsbibliotheek (Central University Library)

Monseigneur Ladeuzeplein 21, 3000 Leuven

During the First World War the university library, then housed in the University Hall, was destroyed by fire. In the 1920s, a new library was built in Flemish Renaissance style on the Mgr. Ladeuzeplein mainly thanks to American funding. On the outside and in the gallery the names of over 300 American educational institutes having contributed to its construction are carved. The carillon in the tower – with its 63 bells one of the largest in the country – is a gift of 16 American engineer associations. The library houses more than three million volumes.

5 Leuven university city

Groot Begijnhof (Great Beguinage)

Schapenstraat, 3000 Leuven

The splendidly restored Beguinage is an oasis of peace in a busy city. Many foreign students and researchers live here together with their Flemish colleagues. In 2000 the Unesco included the 'Groot Begijnhof' on its list of world heritage sites (see page 19).

Campus Heverlee

Kasteelpark Arenberg, 3001 Leuven

After World War II the university set up a large number of institutes, mainly for the positive sciences, in the spacious Arenberg park in the borough of Heverlee, a few kilometres outside the city centre. The splendid Arenberg Castle, where engineer-architects are trained today, is located in the middle of this park. The sports grounds and the sports hall of the Faculty of Kinesiology and Revalidation Sciences are also located in the park.

Campusbibliotheek Arenberg (Campus Library Arenberg)

Willem De Croylaan 6, 3001 Leuven

The Campusbibliotheek Arenberg (CBA) (Campus Library Arenberg), housed in the historic framework of the former Celestine monastery, is one of the largest and most modern libraries for sciences and engineering techniques or the European continent. CBA houses a million books and reference works in a hi-tech environment full of multimedia equipment for students, academics, alumni and other visitors. The old monastery was built by Rombout Keldermans, the new library was constructed by Rafaël Moneo.

Campus Gasthuisberg

Herestraat 49, 3000 Leuven

The University Hospital Gasthuisberg, the largest hospital in Europe after Rome is located just beyond the ring road. The same complex also houses the Education and Research buildings of the K.U.Leuven Faculty of Medicine.

Leuven, beer city

Amid all these leisure activities it seems surprising that Leuven finds any time to work; but it does. In the Middle Ages all commercial activities were centred at the Dijlehaven, near the present-day Fish Market. The focus began to change in the 18th century and breweries and other parts of the food industry started to spread along the banks of the Leuven-Mechelen canal. When brewing became a nationwide industry in the 19th century, Leuven became world famous for its beers, and today is still proud to be known as the beer capital of Belgium.

A fragment of national history

The history of Stella Artois is closely connected with the history of Leuven. The foundation of the university of Leuven in 1425, the digging of the canal Leuven-Rupel in the 18th century, two industrial revolutions and two world wars; all were events that played a fundamental part in the development of this beer town and... of the brewery Artois.

When the name of the brewery 'Den Horen' (the Horn) turns up for the first time in the ducal levy records (1366) it marks only the beginning of a brilliant success story, because by 1537 this brewery had already developed into the most important enterprise in Leuven.

In 1717 'Den Horen' was under control of master-brewer Sebastien Artois and thus for more than a century all the brewer's know-how was handed down from father to son. From then on the brewery bore the name 'Artois' however 'the Horn' functioned as an emblem of the brewery until a few years ago.

Around the turn of the century the brewing of the golden Pilsbeer of low fermentation was started up at Artois. In 1926 - and this for the first time - the brewery brought a barley beer onto the market and called it 'Stella', the Latin word for 'Star'. The famous 'stella', a 'star' in the Brewers' Sky, is a beer that makes beer-fanciers feel at home. And after six centuries the brewery still feels at home in Leuven.

Guided tours


Tourism Leuven handles all requests for guided tours that are organized in cooperation with the Royal Leuven Guide's Association. The standard offer includes visits of the town hall, the great beguinage, Saint Peter's church, etc, however, we also offer six theme walks: along green spots, ladies' walk, mediaeval walk, university walk, statue walk and a walk to Saint Gertrude's and the Vismarkt. Obviously, we welcome your suggestions as well.

Conditions

- > Basic fees: €50 for the first two hours and €20 per extra hour per guide. Charges start from the time of the appointment.
- > Normally, this fee is to be paid to the guide in cash before the tour.
- > For a visit to the Treasury of Saint Peter's an entrance fee of €1.75 per person (for groups from 10 people) or €2.50 per person (less than 10 people) is charged. The fee has to be paid by the group leader at the museum entrance. The admission fee can alter during special exhibitions.
- > Owing to circumstances beyond our control, some buildings may be closed. We apologize for this inconvenience. We do our utmost to inform you as soon as possible.

- > If the visit is cancelled without a timely notice (at least 4 days in advance), a bill of €20 will be sent. This also applies for tours offered by the city of Leuven.
- > The guide will wear a white-and-red badge with GIDS written on it. The tour will be terminated at the appointed time even if it started with some delay. If the group insists on having a full tour, an extra hour will be charged (see fees). The guide will wait for the group for one hour. After this hour the guide will leave the place agreed on. The waitingtime will be charged € 20.
- > The Royal Leuven Guides' Association and the Leuven Tourism Department cannot be held responsible for accidents happening during the visit.
- > The guide does not accept gratuities.
- > Each group will be accompanied by one person who is responsible.
- > When a tour is requested, the group has to organize the transport themselves. A seat and a microphone must be provided for the guide. The coach will only leave the place of appointment after the driver has been instructed by the guide.
- > The town of Leuven offers a free tour to groups (at least 10 people- 2 hours) that come for congresses, colloquiums and seminars, if they stay overnight (2 nights). Applications must be made well in advance and in writing. Admission charges have to be paid by the groups.
- > To optimally enjoy your visit, we advise you to ask one guide for circa 25 persons.

Day trips on the sailing and cycling canal Leuven-Dijle

(every week in July and August. Also on set days in May, June and September)

The Leuven-Dijle canal is a splendid green waterway. The guided day trips by boat from Leuven to Mechelen, with a city visit as well as the canal trips from Leuven to Herent are scheduled twice a week. 

Thanks to this new sports complex on the Philips site, Leuven boasts one of the best developed sports facilities in the country.

For the design, construction and running of the complex a public private cooperation (PPC) was set up. Sportoase, a three-partner joint venture, is entrusted with the realization of the sports complex. After the 34 year lease expires the city will acquire the property rights. During this period the city pays for the use of the sports facilities leased to schools and clubs. Sportoase determines the other user rates.

Sportoase offers many sports. The city is the main user of the swimming pool, the large sports hall with 3,000 seats, the martial arts hall and dancing sports hall. The sports pool (25 m long with 8 lanes) is suitable for competition swimming, water polo, diving and synchronized swimming. The target group pool has an adjustable floor to customise the pool to the user's needs.

The private partner is the main user of the recreation pool and infant swimming pool and has a polyvalent sports hall, a large fitness room, a sauna room, two squash courts, a climbing wall and a catering section with meeting rooms. Men and women with young children can enjoy their favourite sports without a

care as Sportoase also provides a crèche in the complex. Enjoy a drink or a snack in the centrally located café with a view of the sports hall and recreation pool or in one of the other cafés in the building.

There is also a centrally located café that serves as a meeting place for the whole site.

Parks

Leuven is also a city of green spaces. Large expanses of park land and estates on the outskirts of the city provide ample opportunity for leisure and sporting activities. The Provincial Park offers an ideal location where young and old can relax. There are some fascinating walks around the lakes of Park Abbey and in the grounds of Arenberg Castle. An interesting riverside walk follows the Dijle as it meanders through the city. Many of the municipal parks and gardens are open to the public. The magnificently restored Orangery in the Botanical Garden is well worth seeing, and the hothouses full of exotic plants are open to the public.

Kruidtuin (Botanical garden)

'Hortus Botanicus Lovaniensis'. Kapuciinenvoer 30, 3000 Leuven

Leuven is one of the few cities in our country to have a botanical garden. The botanical garden - called 'Kruidtuin' or 'Herb Garden' - is the oldest in Belgium, dating from 1738.

The first scientific gardens were botanical gardens with collections as well as supplies of plants used for medical purposes. The botanical gardens therefore had a direct connection with medicine.

Later on purer botanical gardens were arranged to include plant collections which might become economically conducive; which included unusual plants and plants to be used as study objects.

The narrow concept 'herb-garden' was abandoned and the first botanical gardens or arboreta were laid out. However, the old name 'herb-garden' stayed on for various institutions, such as in Leuven. Within the surface area of approximately 2,2 hectares, one can find an extensive collection of trees, shrubs and bushes. Situated next to the collection of herbaceous plants, herbs, water and tank plants is the greenhouse complex, displaying a variety of tropical and subtropical plants (450 m²).

Due to the Royal decree on 6th July 1976 the orangery became classified as a monument and the whole botanical garden as a landscape.

The botanical garden has a whole new look thanks to restoration work, a new layout and the addition of new elements.

There are regular exhibitions in the orangery, in the gate way and in the open air space. Situated in the centre of a university city, the significance of a botanical garden in didactic, tourism, cultural-historic, economic, scientific and recreational terms is of great importance.

The botanical garden is open free of charge all year round to the general public:

Sint-Donatuspark (Donatus Park)

Vlamingenstraat – Deberiotstraat – Tiensestraat, 3000 Leuven

In the front, on the right (Tiensestraat), the statue 'Abraham' that plays a part in the folklore of Leuven, can be seen. The plane-trees alley lies in the filled out outside moat of the town ramparts on the right of which the first ringwall was built in the 12th century. A few towers, in sandstone and iron sandstone can be observed in the park. The wider part of the park came into being in 1866 by assembling private properties, e.g. the burnt down Saint-Donatus's college and the gardens of three colleges. A large park was laid out in English landscape style.

The park was fully renovated between 1993 and 1998.

splashing pool. In the traffic park they can cycle and drive gocarts. They can row or cycle on a pedal boat on the 5 ha pond. And obviously there is also a climbing wood: the children can climb 'between the branches of the trees' via a route of ropes and large tree huts.

Sports enthusiasts can play tennis, football, volleyball or basketball and the park also has a beautiful roller skating ring and skate ramps.

Yet Kessel-Lo has more to offer than "just" fun. You can learn something too! In the bee-house for instance visitors can follow the activities of the bees from behind glass and a small exhibition tells you all you need to know about honey and bees wax. Twice a year the bee-keeper extracts the honey while the public looks on. At regular intervals visitors can pour or roll candles made of real bees wax. You can ask the bee-keeper for a guided tour.

In the eco centre you will learn a great deal about 'water'. Here various subjects are highlighted such as water pollution, water treatment, water collection, water flora and fauna and rational water consumption.

You can also enjoy yourself in Kessel-Lo by walking in the park and among the flower-beds. A footpath leads to the former abbey of Vlierbeek.


The green lung of Leuven

Together with nearby Meerdaal forest Heverlee wood represents a clear environmental and scenic beacon to the south of the city. These two remnants of the large Kolen forest are still one of today's largest Flemish wood complexes. Both were selected as major nature reserves in the Regional Planning Programme for Flanders and belong to the European ecological network.

The grid-shaped road pattern links the two woods. Yet the vision on both wooded areas differs: Heverlee wood has developed into a real city wood where natural variation is subordinate to the recreation of city dwellers. Walkers, cyclists and all kinds of holiday-makers can relax there in a most enjoyable setting. Large maps immediately offer the visitor the required information, benches are available in various locations and there are explanatory notices near the plants and trees.

As opposed to this nature prevails in the Meerdaal forest. Some sections have restricted access so that nature can thrive in all its diversity.






